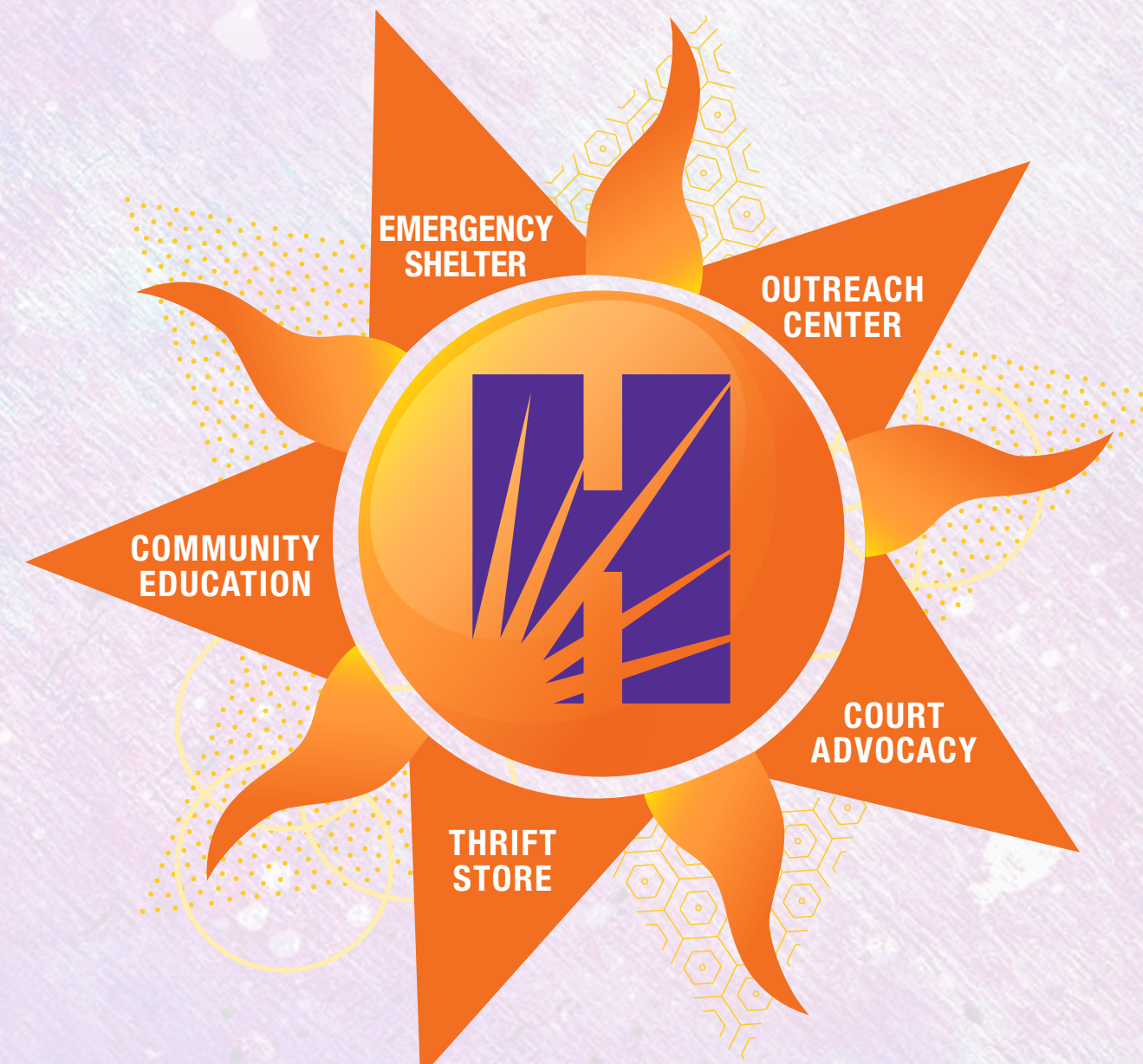

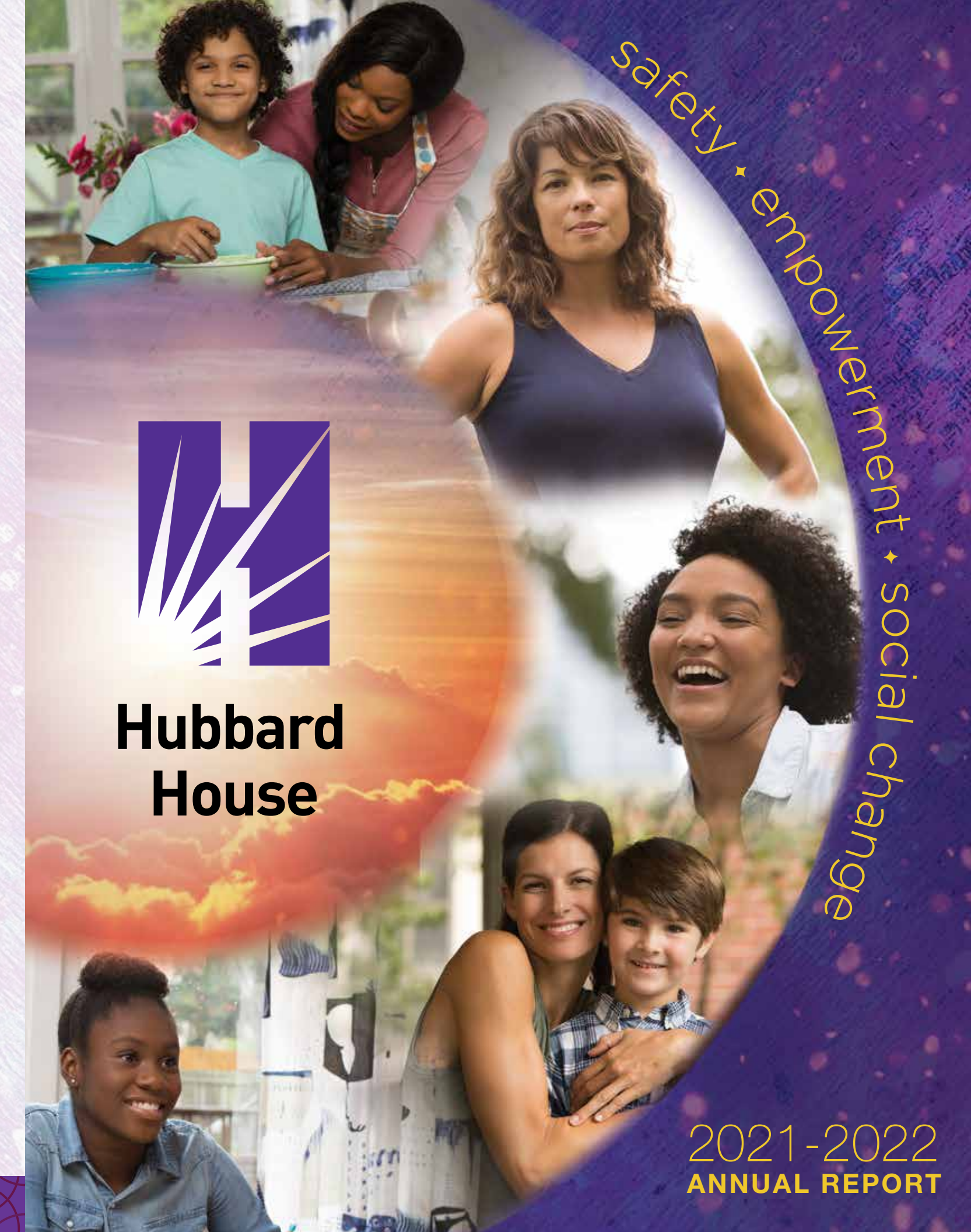

Shelter saves lives:



Susan endured verbal, emotional, and physical abuse, which escalated to strangulation. She called Hubbard House from the hospital, looking for safety for herself and her children. Susan says her time at Hubbard House led her to realize she deserved to be treated with dignity and respect. She deserves a violence-free life, which is the life she now has.

Counseling changes lives:

Eight year old Jeremiah came into shelter with his mother and two siblings. He struggled adjusting to his new life. Hubbard House's Children's Counselor worked to build Jeremiah's self-esteem and confidence. With that support, he began to make friends, developed coping tools, and flourished. He is now known as a social butterfly, and all the kids want to be friends with him.



Advocacy saves lives:



When Maria was 4-years-old, she and her five siblings were forced to watch their mother be physically and verbally abused by her boyfriend. She was reserved when she came into shelter. But over time, through counseling and attentive advocacy, Maria learned how to express her feelings. She now has a smile that lights up the room.

Safe housing changes lives:

Helena was hospitalized as a result of abuse from her boyfriend. "I just couldn't and didn't want to live like this anymore," she said. Helena worked alongside her advocate to not only heal from the physical and emotional trauma, but to find safety. She found an apartment, and Hubbard House provided rental and relocation assistance, to help secure her brighter future.
